International Seminar "Let's have our say"

9-12 July 2019 • Kranevo - Bulgaria • 40 participants

The seminar was organised as the second activity of our annual work plan on youth participation. It had the role to bridge the results of the fieldwork done by MIJARC Europe during the local visits with the theoretical and practical aspects of the participation at local, national, regional and European lever by involving active members in a proactive learning process. The seminar was designed and led based on the methods of non-formal education and relevant approaches using the **Revised European Charter on the Participation of Young People in local and regional life** and

the **"Have your say" Manual.** The successful implementation of the seminar resulted in a magazine of personal stories of participation written and drawn by the participants, the creation of vlogs and of three infographics. The final evaluation results show that the seminar scored high in the hearts and minds of the participants. The percentage of those who believe that they got the basic theory, practical approaches and tools, to help them to build a culture of participation after the seminar is about 92%. During the seminar "Let's have our say!" we discussed the **Revised**. **European Charter on the Participation of Young People in Local and Regional Life**. This was one of the outstanding activities in the seminar to give us thorough knowledge on participation and how it should be maintained at local and regional level. Particularly, the discussions touched upon the sections II and III of the charter, which explained how to raise awareness on participation, how to promote participation among young people, how to support young people's projects, how to encourage them to undertake voluntary work and more. In addition, it was more than effective to discuss also the institutionalised youth participation.

As we learned, the charter defines participation as "having the right, the means, the space, the opportunity and the support to participate in the democratic life of any kind of community and provides both policy principles and instruments for enhancing young people's participation."

After reviewing the charter, we had the chance to exchange with the practices in our countries and point out the similarities and differences on youth policies.

On the last days of the Seminar I was thinking of a word that can actually be the "one" to describe and to be used as a title of what that exact experience was to me and I have it now, here we go.

What I thought of, each and every night, while lying in bed, was that each one of us is a small special particle, a little piece of something huge and we can all work together for a better storyline of that world we live in. International training course "Let's go online"

21-25 August 2019 • Overijse – Belgium • 35 participants

The training course was the third and last international activity of our annual work plan and it aimed to bring the participants closer to e-participation. The participants were encouraged to build their own positions for different topics related to participation and e-participation and they had a possibility to present and discuss in a safe learning environment. They had a possibility to address their comments and questions to Dirk Van Eeckhout, the Thematic Coordinator on Information Policy in the Council of Europe and Rita Jonusaite, part of the secretariat of the YFJ. That was a highly valuable experience that helped the participants to meet stakeholders, gain self-confidence and resilience breaking the present barriers. The participants worked together in intercultural subgroups in order to solve practical case studies through the e-participation tools they have discovered. The most impressive result of the training course was the set up of an online campaign "Every Breath we take" the participants used to raise awarenees on the fires in the Amazon and climate injustice.



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I remember this one special moment . We sat with a group from people from many different countries in our meeting room. Everyone has considered for himself how he has ever found to the youth work. Everyone has thought about his own path and what moves him to work for the youth. Many joyful and emotional moments in a journey through many personal experiences. Something very important has become clearer to me than ever before. We all have our own path that we left and made us who we are now. However, we all have the same destination together. We want to give the youth a voice and create new perspectives. We want to change the world together, no matter where we come from or what our past looks like because we have our common future ahead of us."







#EveryBreathWeTake online campaign

Launched on the last day of our training course, the #EveryBreathWeTake raising awareness campaign aimed to make young people more aware of the fires in the Amazon and climate injustice. The participants used the knowledge and tools they had gained throughout the training course and put them to good use in a campaign that had reached more than 100 people in the first week since its launch.



"Our common home is on fire. The Amazon is burning and we cannot hold our breath until you finally take action. What is happening in the Amazon is affecting us all over the world. It is a global emergency.

Will you watch the fire or will you support us in doing something? In putting pressure on the institutions which are supposed to protect our home and ACT?

Will you help us prevent this from happening again?

This is about #EveryBreathWeTake.

Challenge 3 more people to take a deep breath to remind us about the precious natural resource which is on fire. We need to keep the fight for Climate Justice!"
